Policies and Procedures

Manual. In the January, 2013, newsletter I mentioned that the board was reviewing the Policies and Procedures Manual and even announced it at several of the meetings.

Many members are unfamiliar with this manual; so, I want to explain the purpose of the Policies and Procedures Manual and the differences between it and the bylaws.

The current TBG bylaws were written when our guild, originally the Tidewater Chapter of High Country Basketry Guild (HCBG), separated from HCBG and became an independent guild. Our bylaws, the rules and regulations for governing our guild and guild affairs, were adapted from HCBG bylaws.

The Policies and Procedures Manual was first acknowledged at the November, 2003, meeting when the board recognized the need for written procedures to guide day-to-day guild business. According to **Laura White** it was observed that the same questions and issues were routinely being discussed from year to year at board meetings. The board decided that perhaps a manual which provided background information and answers to commonly-asked questions would be useful and timesaving.

It was determined that the guild needed to write a manual that would comply with the implementation of the bylaw in Article V, Board

and Officers, Section 3 that states: “. . . . The Board shall establish goals, direction, and activities which clarify and enhance the purpose of the Guild.” Consequently, a manual was created to do just that with **Sam Winters**, current TBG member, supervising the writing. In addition, the manual facilitated the guild’s processes to meet requirements to become incorporated and to qualify for not-for-profit status, which were both granted in 2006.

The manual consists of guidelines written in a quick-reference format to assist members with making decisions and executing appropriate procedures. Among the topics are: (1) description of duties for officers, members-at-large, and non-voting board positions; (2) summary of Guilders Weave; (3) explanation for scheduling the guild’s basket weaving classes; (4) listing of procedures for handling displays, demonstrations, and activities; (4) explanation of financial information such as expenses and reimbursements; and (5) schedule of membership dues. Indeed, the manual includes decisions made by the board concerning guild operations and the smooth running of the various programs.

As the guild’s membership increases and as circumstances change, it will be necessary to periodically modify and update the Policies and Procedures Manual. The goal is to complete the manual’s revisions over the next several months and then post it to the members-only page of the website. This will allow our members to see that we are continually improving our guild and working to make sure it runs smoothly.



Ribs 101 by Anne Bowers

Many of you have been anxiously awaiting the arrival of the ribbed basket series taught by Anne Bowers. Thanks to our friend, Sue Legault, the classes will now be happening! So clear your calendar for the following class times. These classes are designed for folks who want to learn ribbed construction of baskets, but have been rather intimidated by them, or frustrated trying to learn how to make them from a pattern. In the past 'series' that Anne has taught, students felt that the progression of techniques were most beneficial to give them the ability to make ribbed baskets on their own.

The baskets will be made in this succession, with the techniques learned in each class being reinforced and added to in following classes. We will begin with a basic 8" Egg Basket, highlighting the making of an 'ear', sighting, whittling and inserting ribs, shaping and decreasing weavers. Second class will be the 10" Egg Basket with the added techniques of secondary rib placement, stabilizer rib, god's eye and weaving for a basket that will 'sit' well. Third class is the Appalachian Herb Basket, when we will learn how to weave on a flat plane, create a 'bow tie', decrease weavers in a different shaped area and add a twill design on the outside. Fourth class will be the Potato Basket, a real classic –



notching ribs, sighting, whittling and inserting ribs in an oval shape, and weaving a five point lashing. Fifth basket is the traditional Key Basket, with techniques including weaving the god's eye around a corner, planning shaping, (this basket is a combination of the Egg and Herb baskets), and weaving to a successful conclusion. Last basket will be the Wall Basket Woven with Naturals, that

will be a fun departure from traditional work and gives everyone a chance to use their newly acquired skills in combination with a cool stick to mount on the wall or place on a table.

Sound like fun? Here are some particulars....all classes will be taught at Anne's studio in Middleway, WV. It isn't far – a drive to the Artisan's Center in Annandale is an easy 1 ¼ hour drive for Anne, just to give you a little perspective. (Her address is 272 Mason Farm Dr, Kearneysville, WV 25430 if you'd like to Mapquest it.) Students MUST be willing to make a commitment for all 6 classes to register. (These are not the kind of classes that you can choose to make 2 or 3 baskets and expect to gain full knowledge of this style of work.) Classes start at 9:00 am and will end between 4 – 5 pm. We can share a lunch or bring individual lunches, whatever you prefer. To register for the series, send your checks directly to Anne, dated for each class date. May 18 – 10" Egg Basket - \$65


June 29 – Herb Basket - \$75
